# Quaker Concern Over Population, QCOP, at Warwick YMG

50 Quakers engaged fully in the talk on global population issues given by Kendal Friend, Ann le Mare at YMG. She focussed particularly on why people have large families, and on the different methods that countries have used to reduced their birth-rates to the replacement level of around 2 per family.

We heard of cheerful Buddhist Thailand, economic incentives in Singapore and the relatively poor Vietnam with a collectivist mindset. The world's greenest country, Costa Rica, is down to 1.8 children per family. With employment and war widowhood making women more independent, plus aid focussed on women, rural, poor, overcrowded Bangladesh is at 2. The very conservative Kerala in India, a state of relatively

low economic growth not based on mass consumption, but with good education, has addressed women's issues from the start. Its birthrate is 1.7.

So what's the problem? It's where there is no security of family planning supplies, no tradition of empowered women and no universal education. Africa has the 15 countries with the highest birth rate and the poorest, such as Niger, Sudan, and Nigeria. They also have the longest running civil wars. Economic development is their preferred strategy to addressing poverty, rather than equality and education for women which invariably reduces the size of families.

The other issue is donor insecurity directed to reproductive health. With the reinstatement and expansion of the Mexico City Policy, the biggest donor has recently made it much harder to fund

clinics.

# Welcome to the Anthropocene!

The UK charity 'Population Matters' has recently launched a major project called the "Welcome to the Anthropocene campaign". This aims to raise awareness that the human impact on the Earth is so deep and damaging that scientists are calling for our era to be called the Anthropocene – 'the age of humans'. In fact, many scientists believe we humans are causing the sixth mass extinction – the last being the end of the dinosaurs. Currently, too few people know about the danger the natural world is in and Population Matters is calling on organisations which educate the public about the natural world to face the facts and give people information about THEM. 



Life has existed on Earth for more than three billion years. In a tiny fraction of that time, wild animals have gone from 99% of the weight of all vertebrate animals on land to just over 1%.

Today, the force with the greatest effect on our planet is us. The pressure of 7.6 billion people is squeezing the life out of our planet, threatening our children's future.



#### Nature is on the run

- Species are becoming extinct at least 100 times faster than they would without human impacts.
- Populations of wild animals have more than halved since 1970, while the human population has doubled.
- Scientists call what is happening today the 'sixth mass extinction' – the fifth was the end of the dinosaurs.
- Because of industry, agriculture and fossil fuel use, carbon dioxide in the air is at its highest level for millions of years and disruption of other chemical cycles is turning seas and rivers into dead zones.
- 2016 was the hottest year since modern records began. Global warming is already causing glaciers to melt, sea levels to rise, species extinctions and an increase in severe weather events.

## Saving the planet

Two hundred years ago, there were less than a billion people on Earth. Today, there are 7.6bn and our population is still growing. According to the United Nations, that figure could double by the end of the century. So great is our impact that scientists are calling for the renaming of this period in our planet's geological history as the 'Anthropocene' – the age of humans.

We can ease the pressure on our world by demanding less from it. We can all help by buying less, reusing and recycling more, moving towards a plant-based diet and having smaller families. Most of all, we can ensure that the number of people on the planet is not too great for the natural world to bear.

#### We can end runaway global population growth by:

- Empowering women worldwide with the freedom to choose their family size
   through education, social change and economic development
- Giving people the help they need to lift themselves out of poverty
- Encouraging people to have smaller families wherever they have the choice to
- Ensuring everyone can access and use modern family planning
